Provider Spotlight

The Unity pupils attending CRISP Vocational Provision recently participated in an outward-bound course in Aberdovey, Wales. Despite harsh weather conditions, the students persevered through various personal, mental, and physical challenges, including powerboat jumps, abseiling, cold water swims, trapeze jumps, and a 14km expedition.



This unforgettable life experience helped the pupils work towards their Duke of Edinburgh award, which is an integral part of the curriculum.

The opportunity reinforced the trust values of Confidence, Challenge, Curiosity, Character, and Creativity. It helped develop their resilience and social skills, which are crucial for lifelong learning and preparation for the future. We are immensely proud of our pupils for accepting and completing this challenging experience.



As part of their personal development curriculum, Ambleside Academy have started a **Friendship Club**. The Friendship Club aim to have a positive impact on the well-being of others. They want Ambleside Academy pupils to meet with, and learn about adults from different walks of life – building tolerance, respect and understanding.

This will be achieved by children in the Friendship Group making half termly visits to Melbourne House, which is a residential care home for the elderly within the Aspley Community. The programme of visits will include a range of activities such as singing, baking, and crafting which the children and adults will carry out together.



On their first visit last week, the children danced, sang, and sat chatting and introducing themselves to the people who live there - showing what a difference a friendship can make.

The Melbourne House staff noted that some of the elderly residents were smiling and communicating in a way they rarely see – really enjoying the children's confident companionship. We'd like to say a big thank you to the children in the Friendship Club, for their positive contribution to our community.

At Unity Academy, a priority is to develop pupils' love of reading and support those who struggle to read. The Academy has raised the reading profile across the Provider network, focusing on reading for pleasure opportunities and ensuring all pupils can access a reading programme in their provisions. It has been evident during the visits to the Providers and discussions with our pupils that the reading culture has developed in all the settings. Our pupils benefit more from reading opportunities, accessing a wide range of texts embedded across the curriculum.

The Providers offer many initiatives to develop a love of reading, such as reading leagues, challenges, and regular group reading sessions. The pupils are more confident and frequently read out loud in class or during intervention sessions. We were delighted that Ofsted recognised this work across the network during our recent inspection "*Pupils are encouraged to read regularly. They read out loud in class, in groups, and to staff members individually. Over the last few years, each setting has concentrated on helping pupils improve their reading"*.

Westbury



Christmas Fayre – the team and pupils have been busily creating festive goods and growing produce in the lead up to the event. Over forty of our parents/carers attended. It was so special that we also had a visit from Santa Claus himself with a sack full of presents.

During this term, the Academy has held three coffee mornings. Each event has seen an increase in parent/carer attendance. Services including the Mental Health Support Service and Change Grow Live attended and offered wellbeing support and guidance to parents/carers in support of their children.

Investing in our pupils



The Early Years Academy kick-starts the Ambleside Authors in Training programme, which the school runs from Reception to Year 6 to develop the children as writers.

Their very youngest children are taught the foundations of letter-formation, spelling and sentence composition, so they learn to accurately say, and write a sentence which makes sense to them and to others.

Investing in our schools



The Trust will install a new calming room in the SEN area in December 2023 (£13,285). The decorating and carpeting programme which has seen investment in nine classrooms with three more planned for 2023/24 (£23,300). The LED lighting has been replaced across the school through the Decarbonisation strategy (£24,000).



The dining hall floor has been replaced (\pounds 2,712) and fixed seating removed (\pounds 650).

Work has begun on creating a Barber Shop. The Trust has established a budget of $\pounds 60,000$ from reserves for this curriculum project. Additionally, a new door was installed leading from the hall to the outside, which included a MAG lock costing $\pounds 7,512$ to enhance site security.

Woodlands



During the easter holidays of 2023, the creation of the allotment and the erection of the polytunnel took place. This allows all children access to allotment education. There are further plans to rejuvenate the internal courtyard to create a calm area for reading, planting and a quiet space for the whole academy community to use.

A further £187,500 has been invested in the outdoor learning environment. Installation was completed at the end of Autumn.

AI Guidance in Schools: a three-pronged approach

This new free guide for school leaders, "Understanding AI for School: tips for school leaders" is a collaboration between Teacher Development Trust (TDT) and the International Society for Technology in Education (ISTE), supported by the Association of School and College Leaders (ASCL), the Confederation of School Trusts (CST) and the National Association of Headteachers (NAHT), aiming to support schools to prepare for the increased presence of AI in all aspects of education.

There are practical strategies for schools to approach AI with a 'three-pronged' approach, including how to offer staff an opportunity to consider its use and learn about AI together. The guide concludes with an FAQ section addressing common concerns.

Investing in our development

The Trust has recently been awarded £450,000 by the DfE to support attendance and persistent absence across all Nottingham City schools. The programme is aligned with the overall attendance strategy and wider inclusion work in the city. Recruitment is underway to launch a team of nine dedicated professionals in January for one year.





The Alternative Provision Specialist Taskforce has received funding to continue supporting pupils attending Denewood and Unity academies until March 2025, thanks to the support of the DfE and local partners. During the autumn term, the APST welcomed two new members to its team of specialists: Ella Foster, who will be working as a Resilience Worker, and Karolina Borecka-Taylor, who will be working as a Counsellor. These two new members will replace Chris and Shomari, who played a significant role in establishing the APST and supporting many pupils and their families during their tenure. We want to thank Chris and Shomari for their valuable contributions to the team.

On 14th November 2023, the APST was invited to participate in a Regional Knife Crime event.

- 1. The event focused on three key themes:
- 2. The impact of knife crime experienced by those most affected.
- 3. The positive efforts being made to reduce serious youth violence.
- 4. The necessary improvements to keep reducing serious youth violence.

The event was an excellent opportunity for the APST to showcase their services and to raise awareness among various stakeholders and young people in Nottingham and the surrounding areas.



The Trust has completed the three application stages for a multi-million-pound purpose-built 7-14 Alternative Provision Free School, increasing the number of our schools and reach across the city. The Local Authority has approved a site for the school, and we are progressing well with discussions. Fingers crossed!

Supporting employee health and wellbeing

The Health Assured service is available to all employees at Raleigh Education Trust. It offers access to emotional support and practical guidance to support your health and well-being. You can speak to a counsellor via structured counselling or the helpline. You can also access legal advice and guidance on topics such as will writing and divorce procedures.

Have you heard about the Wisdom App?

As part of the Health Assured service, you can use the Wisdom App to get instant access to support your mental and physical health. The app has many features, such as an interactive mood tracker, mini health checks to assess your mental well-being, and personalisation options, allowing you to create four-week plans to reach your health aims. You can also access various resources such as recipes, workout videos, and mental health podcasts.
