
Warm welcome to Lady Jane Grey Academy

Together, we have focused on enhancing the quality of teaching, strengthening pastoral support, and raising academic expectations - all with the shared goal of improving outcomes and experiences for every child.

The Academy has embarked on a transformational journey, including the revitalisation of its outdoor learning spaces during the May half-term. We are incredibly proud of the progress made so far and look confidently to the future, united in our mission to empower pupils and serve the wider community with excellence.

Over the past year, Raleigh Education Trust has proudly partnered with the PCC, VRP, and 'It's in Nottingham' to co-develop a bold new social impact model for Nottingham City and Nottinghamshire.

The model isn't about reinventing the wheel; it's about building on the incredible work already happening across our communities. By shifting from short-term fixes to a 10-year vision, we're aligning efforts across all sectors to better support every child and young person (0–25). On July 25, the Trust hosted an event that was a powerful reminder of the collective passion and willingness to think differently, collaborate

This term, the Raleigh Education Trust introduced a fleet of minibuses across its schools, designed to offer pupils greater access to opportunities beyond the school gate. A key part of this

initiative is a free bus service for pupils who face barriers to regular attendance - an important step in **supporting** every child to thrive in a consistent and nurturing school environment.

At Denewood Academy, the service launched in March and has already had a significant impact on some of the school's most hard-to-reach pupils. Since its introduction, weekly attendance has improved by an average of 20%, **providing children** with the stability and support they need to succeed.



"Before the Trust introduced this service, many children who arrived from across the city had experienced a disrupted education and struggled to attend regularly. This service helps them develop positive relationships with adults in school, as they are now coming regularly and experiencing the benefits of being present." Head of School, Mark Clifford

This year, the Trust launched its **Growing Leaders Programme**, a 12-month professional development programme designed to nurture today's and tomorrow's leaders.

Our leadership development programme is structured around seven key themes: leadership styles, professional encounters, line management, coaching culture, financial literacy, reporting and accountability, and evaluation and action planning. In addition, all participants receive half-termly supervision sessions to support their growth and development.

We are pleased to share that eight colleagues from across our schools successfully enrolled in the programme. So far, they have completed sessions focused on leadership styles, professional encounters, and financial understanding. We look forward to their continued progress next year as they **build on this**strong foundation and further develop their leadership capabilities.



Raising Aspirations Through Careers Education

Careers education is a key focus at Ambleside Academy. All our Key Stage 2 pupils work closely with Into University, exploring a wide range of career paths and learning about the opportunities that lie ahead. Our annual Careers Week is a real highlight — **opening pupils' eyes to the world of work and further education**. The week finishes with a whole-school celebration, where pupils dress up as their future selves: pilots, vets, beauticians, palaeontologists, archaeologists, doctors, and many more. The creativity and ambition on show are truly inspiring! One of our most unique and loved initiatives is our Year 6 "Big Day" work experience programme. Pupils write to a member of staff they'd like to shadow, explain why they're interested, and then spend the day learning on the job — dressed for the role and ready to get Involved.
